

# Farming for the Future: Low carbon opportunities for North East Agriculture

ccording to the Scottish A Government, agriculture contributes around a quarter of Scotland's total greenhouse gas emissions, therefore it can be seen as a significant contributor to climate change. Conversely, farming in Scotland is a sector that is one of the worst affected by the impacts of climate change, and farmers and crofters are required to rapidly adapt to cope with the consequences of unseasonable weather, floods, droughts, and increased pest and disease risks. In the face of this, innovative farmers across Scotland are taking steps to reduce their carbon footprint and mitigate for the impacts of climate change on their farming businesses.

During this annualfarming discussion, we will hear from one of the leading family farm businesses that are implementing low carbon technologies on their farm. Dr Elaine Booth of Ednie Farms,

farms her family farm alongside her husband. As well as growing oil seed rape, wheat, barley, and trees, they also have a suckler herd, and their business won the Royal Northern Agricultural Society Good Farming Practice Award in 2007, which recognises success in combining business efficiency with a high standard of environmental management. Elaine and her family have a wind turbine development and they have expanded into other renewable energy initiatives, including solar and biomass. Elaine is keen to share her family's experience and to provide encouragement for other farmers in working towards carbon positive farming businesses.

We are delighted that Alistair McBain from Duncan Farms near Turriff will be our second speaker and panellist. Alistair grew up in the North East of Scotland and studied



Agriculture at SRUC. He now works for a large arable and egg production business in Aberdeenshire, Alistair is currently undertaking a Nuffield Scholarship, with support from the MacRobert Trust. As Alistair explains: "Typically over 60% of the carbon footprint of an egg is from the use of south American soya. This large contribution is a problem for egg producers, but also creates a big opportunity for the reduction of emissions, through the reduction or elimination of sova in diets. I will look at a range of alternative proteins, reviewing their suitability for driving net zero egg production from an economic, nutritional and carbon foot print perspective." Alistair will also share insights from his study tours in North America.

Other speakers will also share their knowledge and experience of alternative options for food production in Scotland that can reduce agriculture's share of our national carbon emissions and increase resilience towards future climate change.
