'Following the opening of 'TT2' there has been immense use, support and interest in the project from national and international visitors. TDG are exploring the options for installing a hub building with potential for cafe, bike shop, hire or a meeting space hub to maintain, sustain and develop Tarland Trails.'

9. Cromar Food Waste Project

We had a successful community kitchen at the Tarland Food and Music Festival, with soup & bread and ice cream and jelly for dessert, alongside our usual pop up event. The weather was fine and we had a great turn out and received donations of £190.

We were sharing the outside space with musicians, and tardigrade hunters which helped to bring in the crowds.











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The Scottish Government is planning to implement a cash first policy for tackling food poverty. With this in mind, the Aberdeenshire Food Fund are inviting food banks and other agencies who give out food, to apply for funding to pass on cash/vouchers direct to the food recipients and cut out the in between steps (which we do – picking up food from depots/supermarkets and give out at pop up shops). This may change the way we work, but we will give our customers plenty of notice of any changes.

We have 4 more pops ups in each of Tarland and Logie Coldstone left in 2023, the last of which will have a Christmas theme and be full of cheer!

There will be a meeting next week to discuss future strategy.

11. Paths and Access

12. Tarland Bee Group

All the hives locked down for Winter at Oldtown and Coull.
Schedule of Winter Talks started for Members. Next members Meeting in December.
There is an urgent need to invite new, younger members to join the Steering Committee.

13. Lego Club

Remains successful. About 70 at the October session. Calum and Duncan Lockerbie's fundraising activities have been a partial success - £1190 has been donated. They both ran a very wet and cold Aviemore Half Marathon, however Duncan sustained a serious knee injury the week after and was unable to complete the illuminator run. Both will run the illuminator circuit, in the dark, once the injury is healed. Two iPads have been purchased using funding from Marr Area which were put to good use at the October meeting, both for using the 3D instruction building and for making stop motion animation. We are currently undertaking a stock check of all sets, and checking for missing pieces. We are looking for volunteers to help set up the club, help out at the club, or to help with sorting Lego. 17. Apple Juice update

2023's apple crop was significantly lower than last year. The orchard was depleted by late October.

Fortunately, one volunteer Paddy Heron donated a quarter of a ton in apples which kept the pressings going.

We completed a total of 5 pressings and produced under 500 bottles. Sales to the 8^{th} of November equal £1,651.29.

The final total will increase as some payments are outstanding and we have bottles to sell at the Creative Fair on the 2^{nd} December Fair.

What Worked this year.

- The new area behind the Apiary was a real bonus. The shelter meant we could press in any weather (excl Storm Bebet)
 - The provision of lighting meant we could also offer evening sessions, while the hose and slabbed area made the clean-up process much easier.
- The use of recycled bottles sterilized by Peter Craig, helped reduce cost and keep us "Green"
- The waste apple pulp continuing to go to Ranna Farm

Things to consider for next year.

- $\circ\quad$ Electric Socket behind the apiary not working DH has contacted the electrician
- Obtain confirmation that Ranna Farm will collect the waste from every pressing. (Twice the waste wasn't collected)
- Expenditure required for next year We need to purchase new labels, new bottles, new jack
 - One of the Pasteurizers is difficult to manage unclear temperature control and timer. Peter Craig has offered to try and come up with a working solution, to avoid buying a new one.
- More trained volunteer teams to work the pressings/pasteurising. Currently reliant on Peter, David and Sandra
- Better management of parking at the apiary (resident complaint despite sending out clear instructions and map to volunteers)
